

IN SPOTLIGHT

The 18-Hour Workday Debate Vs. Invisible Labor of Women in India

Discussions on work culture, productivity, and burnout have been triggered by the recent controversy over Infosys founder Narayana Murthy's proposal that young Indians should work 70-hour weeks to spur economic growth. L&T Chairman S. N. Subrahmanyan added to this discussion by endorsing that extended workdays are necessary for the country's development. Although there are differing views on this issue, one important aspect has been mainly overlooked: the unpaid care work that most women do every day—often for more than eighteen hours—without acknowledgment or compensation.

Millions of Indian women dedicate countless unseen hours to household tasks such as cooking, cleaning, caregiving, and managing their homes, all without financial compensation r wage. This highlights the urgent need to address the gendered dimensions of employment, the unpaid care economy, and the reasons why the discourse on an 18-hour workday remains largely exclusionary—especially for Indian women who are also part of the formal workforce.

Capitalist work cultures are firmly rooted in the belief that economic success results from hard work. In the past, prolonged work hours have contributed to the rapid economic expansion of nations like South Korea and Japan. However, the socioeconomic conditions in India are very different, and disparities in employment participation already exist. India has one of the lowest female labor force participation rates (FLFPR) in the world because women are excluded from the formal workforce due to cultural norms, safety concerns, and household duties. For women who already juggle caregiving and professional obligations, advocating for a 70-hour workday is unreasonable.

Another critical factor influencing workplace culture is the urban-rural split. India's corporate elite, who support more extended workdays, work in affluent, urbanized environments with plenty of domestic help. The argument is pointless for working-class women and rural laborers, who already put in 14–16 hours a day juggling childcare, household duties, and agricultural labor without getting credit.

The Unpaid Care Work Crisis

The double burden, sometimes known as the second shift, is a well-known phenomenon in which women balance professional work and household duties. Women provide 3.26 billion hours of unpaid care work daily, worth around ₹19 lakh crore annually, according to Oxfam India (2020). While the

global average is three times, Indian women spend ten times as much time providing unpaid care as males. If unpaid care work were monetized, it would contribute over 7.5% of India's GDP. Despite its economic importance, unpaid labor is still hardly discussed in the workplace or policymaking. The argument for an 18-hour workweek ignores the excessive workload that women now face.

The narrative surrounding long work hours primarily benefits corporations that see increased productivity but at the cost of employee well-being. The absence of workplace policies recognizing caregiving

responsibilities disproportionately affects women and single parents. The gender gap in leadership roles means that most decision-makers advocating for long hours are men who do not experience the same household burden. Furthermore, by ignoring unpaid care work in economic calculations, investment in social infrastructure like childcare, elder care, and parental leave is sidelined. This narrative reinforces patriarchal structures where only paid labor is seen as valuable, while women's invisible labour is taken for granted.

Indian women encounter substantial social and economic obstacles due to unpaid caring duties. Many are compelled to select flexible, low-paying employment or take professional interruptions, which restricts their ability to advance in their careers. Their general health is impacted by the strain of unpaid labor, which also causes mental and physical tiredness. Furthermore, women's bargaining power within households is diminished by their lack of financial independence, which furthers gender inequality.

A Sustainable and Inclusive Work Culture

Instead of glorifying extended work hours, India must focus on a sustainable and inclusive work culture. Additionally, recognizing and redistributing unpaid care work is crucial. The 2020 Time Use Survey by the Government of India should be integrated into national economic policies to formally account for unpaid work in GDP calculations. Encouraging men to take on more household and caregiving responsibilities can also bring about meaningful change. Besides, investing in social infrastructure, such as publicly funded childcare centers, community kitchens, and elderly care support, can ease household burdens, allowing more women to join and sustain employment.

Nordic countries such as Sweden, Norway, and Finland recognize unpaid care work in economic policies and provide

affordable childcare, generous parental leave, and work-life balance policies. We can draw lessons from these countries to create a more balanced, gender-inclusive workforce. Before discussing how many hours people should work, we must recognize, redistribute, and reduce unpaid labor, especially for women. Establishing a fair workplace culture where all paid and unpaid work is appreciated equally will lead to actual economic development. Rather than working longer hours, the real issue is to work more effectively, fairly, and inclusively.

Who Can Seek Help:


Anyone who is registered student or staff of K.R. Managalam University


